


We believe that all students benefit from diversity, and that they learn more, and learn better, if they are stretched and challenged by views and experiences unlike their own. To that end, we work to recruit students from a wide range of backgrounds and demographic groups, including groups currently under-represented at Cambridge, and we do our best to ensure that no student with the ability to succeed here is deterred by misconceptions or a lack of information about what our processes entail.

To achieve these goals, our Admissions Office runs an evidence-led, strategic and carefully evaluated programme that combines universal provision of resources with a series of targeted events and initiatives, both within the UK and internationally. We work closely on many projects with a number of other Colleges and with the Cambridge Admissions Office, but are nevertheless proud to stand as one of the most forward-thinking and proactive institutions within the University. We hope you will be interested to hear some of the highlights of this year's work and we would welcome your engagement with and support for our programmes.

As mentioned in last year's *Outreach News*, Christ's was successful in its bid to launch a second HE+ consortium, based at **Worcester Sixth Form College**, involving students from schools across the county; including **Worcester**, **Droitwich**, **Stourport**, **Redditch**, and **Evesham**.

The consortium, in collaboration with Christ's, runs a sustained year-long programme, including academic extension classes, HE information and guidance sessions, and a visit to the University. Students are also encouraged and supported to continue their subject exploration beyond the HE+ classes.

Following its successful pilot year, we are looking to expand the consortium to **200-250 students**, and have approached several schools in the county about participating next year.

Residentials at Christ's



Residentials, or Easter and Summer Schools, are an opportunity to bring students from groups that are currently under-represented at Cambridge to Christ's for a more sustained and intensive programme.

Residentials allow us to re-create elements of student life for a few days, and to give students who have never previously visited the University, or even considered applying, the chance to live in College.

Through the academic events they attend, students gain the opportunity to explore their subject interests in more detail, whilst the admissions-related sessions dispel myths about Cambridge, and provide the information they need to stand the best chance of making a competitive application to top universities.



Spotlight on... Teach First Residential

For 2019 we added a third national residential to our annual programme: the Teach First Residential, the pilot year of which we co-hosted with King's College in April. Teach First work with a network of almost 1,000 schools nationwide, located in some of the most economically disadvantaged areas of the country. Statistically, students at these schools are significantly less likely to go to university than their wealthier peers, and even less likely to attend top universities. However, many of them are capable of achieving the grades necessary for Cambridge.

The Teach First Residential was designed to provide high-attaining students from these schools with an opportunity to attend a two-day programme of subject enrichment sessions, taster experiences and admissions workshops. Students attended classes in subjects they were currently studying, whilst also having the chance to try new subjects they had not previously considered, including anthropology, neuroscience, and linguistics. They also got to know some of our current students and enjoyed a private performance from the famous Cambridge Footlights.

Many of the attending students are eligible for Free School Meals or would be the first in their family to go to university. We found them to be engaged, highly able and ambitious students, who made the most of this opportunity to explore life at a top university and to find out what they need to do to study here. We look forward to developing this event further in future years.

International Outreach

Spotlight on... Denmark



We visit Denmark twice each year, once to attend the Nordic Study Abroad Conference in Copenhagen each September, and once to tour the country in the spring with our partner organisations, the Danish Academy of Talented Youth (DATY), Danish Students Abroad and Project Access.



Additionally, by hosting a return visit from the DATY at Christ's each October, the students then have the chance to see first-hand what it is like to study here.

We have been delighted to receive some fantastic applicants from Denmark over the years, and hope this relationship will continue to develop in the future.

InsideUni



Our former JCR Access Officer, Shadab Ahmed (Natural Sciences, m. 2016), has returned to Christ's in the autumn to complete his studies following a year as the Cambridge University Student Union (CUSU) Access Officer.

Plans for Next Year

As part or evaluative approach to our Outreach programme, we are constantly reassessing our current provision and looking for ways to improve it. Over the next year, we will therefore be launching several new initiatives to address specific barriers to access that we have identified.



Teachers are key partners in our work with students, but face immense pressures on their time. To support them, we've teamed up with **Peterhouse** to run a new teacher residential event in Easter 2020. This will be targeted at schools that are struggling to increase their Oxbridge application success rates and will offer two days of highly effective CPD for our colleagues.

From 2019-20 we will be supplementing our existing offer-holder mentoring scheme with specialist support sessions for students who have been asked to sit STEP examinations, but cannot access STEP preparation through their schools.



TARGET OXBRIDGE

Target Oxbridge is a programme that aims to help black African and Caribbean students increase their chances of securing a place to study at Oxford and Cambridge. The University of Cambridge has partnered with Target Oxbridge since 2017 and Christ's held our first annual day for Target Oxbridge students on 30 August—more news next year!





Continuing our alumni-themed Taster Days, we will be adding a new event in 2019-20: an Economics Taster Day, themed around the work of our nobel-prizewinning former student and Fellow, James Meade. We hope to use this event to attract more applicants to Economics from under-represented backgrounds.


